- 1. Action Requested: This memorandum recommends that you release the attached unclassified TWA 800 Briefing transcript to the National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) for placement on the public record. The attached letter to the Chairman of the NTSB, for your signature, will accompany the transcript.
- 2. Background: Based on a request to the DCI from the Chairman of the NTSB, OTI provided an unclassified briefing on its analysis of eyewitness accounts of the 17 July 1996 TWA Flight 800 crash to the NTSB's Witness Group—consisting of NTSB investigators and representatives from each of the parties to the investigation (Boeing, the Airline Pilots Association, the Federal Aviation Administration, the International Association of Machinists, and TWA). The Witness Group was tasked with studying the eyewitness accounts of the accident. Legal Counsel also attended. Recently, the NTSB requested CIA to release the Briefing transcript to them for placement on the NTSB's public docket with other information collected during its investigation.
- 3. Recommendation: Based on a review of the facts, I recommend that you approve release of this transcript. The NTSB will soon be lifting a gag order that had been on Witness Group members, so we can expect the Briefing and its contents will be discussed by seemingly authoritative individuals in public—some of whom have already misquoted

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SUBJECT: Release to NTSB the Transcript of 30 April 1999 Briefing on TWA Flight 800

CIA's Briefing in private according to the NTSB. The transcript will also serve to support the intelligence success story that has already been publicly touted (the CIA-produced video of its analysis was released by the FBI when it closed its criminal investigation).

In short, release would put CIA in a position of control, avoid the appearance that we are holding something back, and avoid selective release of parts of the transcript text.

He ran from the restaurant on the bay side, across Dune Road, to the beach on the ocean side.

There was a haze over the ocean so he could not see the impact when the plane hit the water. He did hear two explosions and felt the concussion in his chest.

He did not see anything else in the sky. The glowing ball did not appear to be dropping when he saw it before the explosion. He saw nothing leave from the ground. He did not see any flames or smoke emitting from the glowing ball.

He had drank two beers before seeing this. His friend MULLANE and his wife DONNA also saw this. He said it was not like the Challenger explosion except for the trail of smoke after the impact. He was facing due west when he was having dinner.

The smoke, which trailed this object, was whitish in color and the band of smoke was narrow. It looked like a flare or Roman candle flying into the air. The object flew at an angle into the air and neither it, nor its impact with the plane, made any noise. There was one flame which came from the object, then a second once it struck the plane. On the morning after the explosion of Trans World Airline (TWA) Flight 800, Mr. SVEN FARET, residing at 30-A Main Parkway, Plainview, New York, telephone number (516) 349-5999, and Mr. KEN WENDELL, residing at 107 Lodge Avenue, Huntington, New York, telephone number (516) 271-2681, were brought to the Coast Guard Station by Special Agent (SA) JOSEPH P. The object, according to FARET, definitely exploded below his plane because the smoke trail after the explosion was at seven and a half  $(7\ 1/2)$  thousand feet. He realized it was a plane that exploded when he flew over to the area.

Upon exploding, the debris fell quickly and straight down. As the plane fell, the fire had a long trail to the ocean surface where it spread out along the water. Flame chutes erupted from the water.

He then called flying services and saw boats heading over the scene.

FARET advised that the gaseous cloud remained similar to the challenger explosion.

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

A second later, he glanced again and saw what he described as a "red glow" or "red dot" on the aircraft. Having seen this, he brought it to the attention of Peter King.

Seligenbrunn and King now see the airplane nosing at an angle towards the ground. They continued looking as the airplane disappeared behind trees in the horizon. Seligenbrunn heard a blast and saw a red flash through the trees and extending upwards. He further states that the aircraft appeared to remain intact for the period of his observation.



The flare was already in mid-air when she first saw it, she did not see it leave the ground. The flare had an orange tail and was traveling south to southwest. She watched the flare rise through the air and then come down a little before it exploded. CARRAO did not see a plane before she saw the explosion. The explosion occurred approximately ten seconds after CARRAO first saw the flare in the sky.

CARRAO first realized that a plane had exploded when e saw the plane break into two pieces as it fell straight to the ground. From the position she was in at the time she saw the xplosion, she was able to point out in the sky the flares course of travel, as well as the point of the eventual explosion.

CARRAO saw a large red barge named the ARUBA leaving the East Moriches Coast Guard Station at about 8:00 PM that night, heading in a southerly direction.

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number one drawing his attention to it. However, object number one appeared like it was initially going to slightly miss object number two unless it made a dramatic correction at the last moment. In less than a second, DELGADO believed object number one impacted with object number two; however, DELGADO explained that it occurred when he must have blinked because he did not actually see the point of impact. DELGADO then observed a white "puff" (white flash) approximately the size of a small ball in the sky, however, he heard no noise. Out of the puff came two objects that arched upward from the initial impact trailing smoke. DELGADO said the objects than appeared to turn into large rectangular balls of fire descending at an angle down past the horizon of the trees. DELGADO stated that the rectangular fire balls were the equivalent in size to a quarter (1/4) of a piece of paper (8"X11") from his vantage.

Initially, DELGADO said the explosion appeared to be approximately 1.5 - 2.5 miles from where he observed the event, and he recalled he was concerned that the burning object might have landed on Dune Road or the outlying beach area.

After the burning object fell beyond the horizon of the trees he did not observe or hear anything else.

DELGADO believed, after some retrospect, the entire chain of events took approximately seven (7) seconds from the time he first sees object number one and when the explosion occurred.

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DELGADO further described object number one as an elongated object that had an oval "head" with an extremely bright white center that had a reddish pink "aura" about the object. The tail was the size of his pinkie nail which seemed to become smaller as it ascended in the air. The tail, grey in color moved in a "squiggly" pattern which provided a sense of direction.

After the explosion, DELGADO got into his vehicle with the windows down and the radio off and drove in the direction of this occurrence. DELGADO drove to Dune Road, Westhampton, where he met his wife. DELGADO believed he had witnessed some type of explosion over the beach area, however, he did not know actually what he had observed. Later that day, DELGADO learned of the plane crash and realized that he had observed the entire

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occurrence.

At the conclusion of the interview, DELGADO brought the undersigned Agents to the exact location where he made his above

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described observations and he reenacted the events prior, during and immediately following the event. In addition, a rough draft drawing was created. DELGADO's point of reference was a telephone pole next to a yellow fire hydrant located on Mill Road.

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



The evening of July 17, 1996, KERR was at the West Hampton Yacht Squadron in Westhampton Beach standing on an outside deck. KERR heard someone say, "Look!", and he turned his attention south over the ocean. KERR observed a red flare, arching in the sky and descending downward. As it descended downward, he heard a "thump" and then there was a sudden burst of flames. This large body of flames then split into two smaller masses, and descended away from each other and out of view beyond Dune Road.

KERR did not see the flare until it arched in the sky. Initially, because it was so bright, he thought that it was only about 1/4 mile away in the bay area. The flare did not have a tail as it arched, but he did observe a tail of smoke as the flare descended. The flare took several seconds to descend which caused KERR to expect to see a parachute attached to it. However, the flare then burst into a fireball. After the masses descended south of Dune Road, KERR realized that it occurred much farther away, and must have been something larger than a flare.

KERR advised that he subsequently spoke to an individual named TOM DOUGHERTY who advised that he had seen something shoot outlof the Dunes on July 17, 1996. DOUGHERTY can be reached at (516) 728-5117, 3 Beachland Ave., E. Quogue, NY.

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
JOHN and JOYCE KEYSER was interviewed by Detective CALVIN POWELL and Detective STEPHEN JENSEN of the Suffolk County Police Department. The interview was conducted on July 19, 1996.

In furtherance of the investigation of the crash of TWA, Flight 800, on July 19, 1996, at 17:15 Hours, conducted an interview of Mr.and Mrs. JOHN and JOYCE KEYSER. The KEYSERS of 60 Apollo Drive, Aquebogue, New York, report that while driving southerly on Church Lane, Aquebogue, New York, they observed the following details:

Mrs. KEYSER relates observing while looking southerly, a golden glowing, moving object, easterly direction above the tree top line. The unusual golden color of the elongated object drew Mrs. KEYSER's attention. Mrs. KEYSER noticed a red light on the object and though approximately 15-20 miles out, assumed it to be a plane. Mrs. KEYSER states, suddenly the plane took an unusual, 45 degree dive with no visible flames or smoke. Below the tree top line, a large reddish, flaming fireball immediately rose above the tree line, where the plane had descended. The entire observation was approximately (90) seconds in duration. She saw the flare when it was already at a midpoint in the sky. She was facing south overlooking Moriches Bay and Dune Road. The MIRELLs stated that immediately after talking to the elderly couple, they approached the receptionist's desk at WESTHAMPTON BEACH AND TENNIS CLUB, and told the girl behind the desk to call the police, which she did.

In addition, the MIRELLs stated that a film crew was at the WESTHAMPTON BEACH AND TENNIS CLUB filming a movie. They believe that a male, five feet nine inches (5'9"), Caucasian, with a ponytail, may also have seen the plane crash.

On July 18, 1996, the MIRELLs came back to the boat slip at WINDSWEPT MARINA, 215 Atlantic Avenue, East Moriches, NY 11940, telephone (516) 878-2100, via a boat named CONTROL C, and gave approximately two (2) hours worth of interviews to news reporters. MIRELL stated that he spoke to many news reporters, but he particularly remembered contacting CBS News and WINS Radio.

The MIRELLs also stated that the owner of WINDSWEPT MARINA had a dredge boat out in the water. They believed that the crew of the dredge boat may have had a better view of the crash.

ERIC MIRELL stated that after hearing that a TWA jet had, in fact, crashed in the ocean and after hearing news reports that a missile may have been fired at the jet, he thought he remembered seeing a stream of white or grey smoke prior to seeing the red dot in the sky at approximately 8:30 p.m. ERIC MIRELL

stated that the stream of smoke came up from the water. He stated that from his angle and vantage point, the stream of smoke came straight up to the plane. JANET MIRELL stated she did not see a stream of smoke.

RAYNOR advised that she and ALLISON BELL were walking along the track at Westhampton High School, Lilac Road, Westhampton Beach, New York during the evening of July 17, 1996. This track is less than two (2) miles from Westhampton Beach on the Atlantic Ocean. While walking facing the south, at approximately 8:30 - 8:40 P.M., RAYNOR observed a bright white light arching into the sky from west to east. It appeared to her to be emanating from Westhampton Beach, at an angle not exactly vertical, and travel over the ocean. At the time, she thought it was a firework.

This light reached high into the sky, at an angle of

RAYNOR saw no smoke with the white light during its ascent, and did not hear any sound or explosion.

On the evening of Wednesday, July 17, 1996, GERI and JOHN VACARI were on their boat with three of their friends, BILL POMERY of 209 Old Neck Road, Center Moriches, telephone number 878-2415, LOU DESEPOLI of 180 Holiday Boulevard, Center Moriches, telephone number (516) 874-2175, and JOE KNOECHEL of 201 Old Neck Road, Center Moriches, telephone number (516) 874-4833. At about 8:20 PM, GERI VACARI saw what she described as a pink glow that looked like a flare, larger than a star, up high in the sky. saw it descend for about 30 seconds. When it was over Fire Island, it exploded into an orange ball of flames. It separated into two distinct columns of fire, then hit the water. Next, she saw flames shoot up once from the surface, then all that she saw was black smoke. She stated that her party called the Coast Guard and that they were the third such call the Coast Guard received, and that the Coast Guard would send a boat out to check it out. She further stated that the explosion reminded her of the space shuttle Challenger explosion in 1986. GERI VICARI's perception of the pink glow was that it was moving away from her position. When she indicated her position on a map of the area and the direction, she saw the pink glow go, it appears that it was the same direction of the crash site.

JOHN VICARI stated that his wife GERI was the first person to witness the glow. However, he said that he thought he saw the pink glow ascend and then descend. His approximation of the height of the pink glow was about 10,000 feet.

GERI VICARI had mentioned that her and JOHN had discussed the incident on Thursday night with some people at the dock and that they had pretty much seen the same thing.

The evening of July 17, 1996, ABRUZZO was having dinner with her husband, VINCENT ABRUZZO, at RIVERVIEW RESTAURANT in Oakdale, Long Island. ABRUZZO had a window seat in the restaurant. Her seat faced eastbound over the Great South Bay. Her husband was facing westbound.

At about 8:15 PM, ABRUZZO saw an orange elongated mass shoot straight up from the horizon. From her vantage point, the object was like a wide baseball bat. She did not see any smoke trailing the object. An orange glow seemed to follow it, but quickly dissipated.

The object went straight up into the sky for about two seconds, reached its apex, and then broke apart and descended in smaller orange glowing pieces. ABRUZZO did not observe any fire ball, and did not hear any sounds throughout the event.

ABRUZZO estimated that the object ascended from several miles in the distance, but could not tell if it originated from land or sea. Because of the bright glow of the object and it's distance from her, ABRUZZO thought that the object was something more than just a flare. As the pieces broke and descended, ABRUZZO lost visual contact beyond the horizon.



It hovered for a second, appeared to break apart from Lively OUT BEFORE its round shape, and fell to the horizon in approximately two seconds. As the bigger explosion came down it became less red from and more smokey - graver about half of the and more smokey - grayer about half of the way down. The big explosion came down along pretty much the same line as the white line had gone up. The entire incident from the time the white line first appeared until the explosion met the horizon took approximately 10 to 15 seconds.

ROBERT CASOLA earlier had been at the 1 mile marker South of Shinnecock Inlet and had proceeded on a heading of 360 degrees magnetic to return to the inlet. The white line was approximately in a one o'clock position relative to the one mile marker from ROBERT CASOLA.

CORCORAN stated she was on Rogers Beach with her husband, DERMIT and her son on Wednesday, July 17, 1996. They were standing in the area of Lashley Pavilion in front of the lifeguard chair looking directly into the ocean. CORCORAN saw a "yellow star" about ten miles out to sea. She noticed at least three black/red pieces flying out in an umbrella shape. She determined the distance by the time it took for the sound to reach her. The object fell about six seconds to the water then black smoke rose for about four seconds then she heard a rumble. The rumble was the only sound she heard and it seemed to be one long rumble coming at her in about three "waves".

The fiery object was falling in two main pieces which were a deep orange/red and gave the appearance of paint dripping down a wall as it fell straight down. As it hit the water it appeared to flame up and maybe there was another explosion. Flames went up into the sky about 1/5 to 1/4 the height from the altitude of the original sighting. CORCORAN stated another piece flew to the right. This piece which was a yellow/gold color flew a little higher then the flames and started back down and went out of sight.

CORCORAN stated about one minute after all this was over she had the impression the object that fell was a large airplane. Just as the rumbling stopped a military helicopter flew by.

His attention was drawn south by what he thought was two claps of thunder. DOUGHERTY observed an orange/white glow diminishing in size as it moved away from him. Glow was rising skyward from southwest of his position. He thought it was a flare or fireworks from the beach. At top of trajectory he observed a whitish glow and an object dropped into the ocean, on fire. He then heard more thunder and an orange ball of flames dropping toward the ocean. He states houses on south side of Dune Road obstructed his view of the ocean.

Distance of sightings cannot be stated. Witness states he was accompanied by KEMBRINK, LISA, Southampton Town Attorney and a Southampton Police Officer, name unknown.

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Mr. EDWIN EVANS was interviewed by Detective MICHAEL CALVIN and Detective GARY MILLER of the Suffolk County Police Department. The interview was conducted on July 20, 1996.

On July 20, 1996, the undersigned and Detective GARY MILLER 953, interviewed EDWIN A. EVANS, Date of Birth July 15, 1966. The interview took place at Mr. EVANS residence at the Sag Harbor Inn, 30 West Water Street, Sag Harbor, New York, Room 303, Telephone number 725-2417. The interview started at approximately 18:30 hours. In sum and substance, EDWIN EVANS related the following on July 17, 1996, at about 20:30 hours, he was in a boat owned by BOB CASOLA. LUKE CASOLA and ZACHERY CLANAHAN were also on the boat. They were fishing in the ocean off Shinnecock Inlet. The boat was heading north toward the inlet on a line from the one mile sea buoy. They were about 1/4 to 1/2 mile north of the buoy. He saw what he thought was a flare straight behind the boat or a little to the right of the boat. He was not able to estimate the height of the flare. He described the flare as a white wispy trail that went straight up. When he saw this, he said "look at the flare" to the other people orathe boat. He followed the flare for about five seconds, when the flare turned into an orange burst. He then saw black smoke, but he did not see anything fall to the water. The point where the flare turned into an orange burst which looked to be several miles south of the mile marker. The lighting was such that he could still see the mile marker that was about half mile from his location.


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BRIAN KIRCHNER and DOUG FLYNN were telephonically interviewed pertaining to the night of July 17, 1996. KIRCHNER and FLYNN contacted the New York Office of the FBI relative to what they saw while boating on July 17, 1996. According to KIRCHNER and FLYNN, they were with three other individuals at approximately 8 o'clock on Wednesday evening, July 17, 1996. They were surfing by Great Gun beach in Moriches Bay west of the Moriches inlet. At approximately 8:30 KIRCHNER and FLYNN stated that the visibility was pretty good and it was just about dusk. They saw what appeared to be a flare being fired from a boat in the bay. They stated that the flare did not appear to be an ordinary flare, and it could have been something like a fireworks, but the burst at the end of the flare seemed pretty unusual. It was not a normal boat flare that they are used to. They said the flare disappeared into black smoke behind a dune and it burst pretty low over the horizon. The boat that these individuals thought that the flare came from was a Pro-line center console occupied by two males white, thirty years of age. This boat was approximately two hundred yards away from KIRCHNER and FLYNN while they were surfing, but they could not tell how far away it was from them when they saw the flare being fired. They said these males did not appear to be fishing and seemed to just be sitting in the boat.

Both KIRCHNER and FLYNN stated that another unusual incident occurred approximately 8 o'clock that night, when a small single engine plane (perhaps yellow in color) flew west approximately fifty feet over the water and then disappeared. Approximately twenty minutes later at about 8:20 p.m. the plane came back from the other direction again very low over the water.

Both KIRCHNED and FLYNN stated that when the flare (or what appeared to be a flare) burst they did not hear or see any other explosion or burst of light. It wasn't until they got home that they heard about the TWA disaster. KIRCHNER and flynn that they heard about the TWA disaster. KIRCHNER and flynn stated that when they saw this flare go up they were pulling away stated that when they saw this flare go up they were pulling away from the dock on the bay side of the barrier beach. All the passengers in the boat were sitting facing south and the boat was

DOUG FLYNN, seventeen years of age, date of birth May 18, 1979, resides at 35 Surrey Drive incenter Moriches, New York, telephone number (516) 878-1687. Also on the boat were LUKE KEISER, telephone number (516) 874-4681. KEVIN PLANZ, telephone number (516) 878-0332 and DONNIE DAVIS ALSO of Center Moriches, telephone number unknown.

On 7/20/96, SA William F. Lynch, Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), interviewed BRIAN KIRCHNER, a white male, who resides in at 56 Hewitt Blvd, Center Moriches, New York. KIRCHNER was interviewed regarding his sightings of a "flare" he observed rising from the ocean, in the vicinity of SMITH POINT OUTER BEACH, at approximately 8:30 PM, on 7/17/96. He advised as follows:

BRIAN KIRCHNER and his friend DOUG FLYNN, were surfing from approximately 7:00 PM to 8:15 PM, at the above beach, on the evening of 7/17/96, and were approximately 100 feet off shore. While surfing, they noticed a white "PRO LINE" type fiberglass boat, which appeared to be 19 - 20 feet in length. This boat was approximately 300 feet further out in the water, making it approximately 400 feet from shore. The boat was occupied by two dark haired white males, who were not fishing, and KIRCHNER noted the boat was not anchored.

At approximately 8:15 PM, KIRCHNER and his friend DOUG FLYNN stopped surfing, departed the beach, and began to make their way to "GREAT GUN BEACH" marina, which was directly north of where they had been surfing, but over the sand dune, and on the inlet.

At approximately 8:30 PM, as KIRCHNER and FLYNN were pulling away from the marina dock in their boat, KIRCHNER noted a flare rising from the ocean side of the sand dune, in the vicinity of where he and FLYNN had been surfing, and in the general vicinity of where the aforementioned boat had been.

The "flare" was rising just to the left of the flag pole on GREAT GUN BEACH, as one views that flag pole, looking toward the ocean, while standing on the marina dock.

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
The "flare" went straight up, and KIRCHNER seeing black smoke, assumed it had burned out.

KIRCHNER stated he has been "around the water" all his life, and has seen many flares. He described this flare as larger than usual, and noted that it also climbed more steeply than usual.

KIRCHNER also recalled that at approximately 8:00 PM, just before he and FLYNN stopped surfing, he noted a small yellow and white plane flying west, along the beach, at approximately 50 feet over the water. At 8:05 PM, he recalled that same plane returning, now flying easterly, along the beach.

Finally, KIRCHNER also recalled that a woman named First Name Unknown (FNU) (PERRY) who resides on Senix Avenue, Center Moriches, New York, had also seen the above described "flare" at the same time he had. He recalled that Ms. PERRY had

On July 20, 1996, ANTHONY LORE, Date of Birth (DOB) June 5, 1952, was interviewed at his home, 29 Hewitt Boulevard, Center Moriches, New York, telephone number (516) 878-0729. On July 17, 1996, at approximately 8:30 PM to 8:45 PM, LORE was on his boat, with his wife, docked at the SENIX MARINA, 50 Senix Avenue, Center Moriches, New York. THOMAS MACKIE, Surveyor, GREAT LAKES DREDGING COMPANY, 816 Dune Road, West Hampton, New York, telephone (516) 288-9040, was advised of the identities of the interviewing Agents and purpose of the interview and thereafter provided the following information:

On Wednesday night, July 17, 1996, he was on West Hampton Beach starting at 7:00 PM, to set up grade stakes on the beach.

At approximately 8:40 PM, he was facing south, into the ocean and looking generally upward, toward the sky, which was somewhat lit. To the east of him, he first noticed a red/orange glow in the sky, as it travelled easterly and grew in size. After two to three seconds, he heard the first of two explosions. A small fireball arched and then, a second or two later, the second explosion occurred. MACKIE explained that this second explosion caused a bigger, bright orange fireball.

MACKIE stated that after the second explosion the large fireball fell down toward the horizon in two pieces. A large piece (west) and smaller piece (east) fell together and could be seen as a mountain of flames as it hit the horizon. Black smoke, topped by white smoke could be seen a short time afterward in the area of the flames.

MACKIE estimated that this occurred nine or ten miles out to sea from the beach and about one mile east of his location. MACKIE stated that the initial red/orange glow came from the North-Northwest direction (over his left shoulder). He heard the noise of the explosion about 45 seconds after seeing it and estimated the distance from that.

MACKIE stated that he is currently residing at 33 Peacock Path, East Quogue, New York, telephone (516) 653-8110. The number for his home office is 1-800-323-7100.

DEANA MICELI was interviewed at her residence, 4 Grand View Drive, Blue Point, New York. After being advised of the identities of the interviewing agents and the nature of the interview, MICELI provided the following information:

At about 8:30 P.M. on the evening of July 17, 1996, MICELI was on her deck which extends into, and directly overlooks Patchogue Bay. MICELI was facing due south toward Davis Park and Watch Hill when she saw three orange lights shoot out from the horizon in quick succession. The lights were solid orange in color and had a yellow tinge toward the outside. The lights seems to originate from the Davis Park Island area itself. MICELI estimated that the distance from her deck to Davis Park was about five miles.

The orange lights appeared to be heading toward her, which would be northbound, as they appeared to be getting larger. However, after only about two seconds, when the lights were only about two inches above the horizon, the lights disappeared.

MICELI did not hear any sounds at all. MICELI believed that this was more that just a flare or a firework because of the density of the orange glare.

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PATRICIA NELSON, Date of Birth-November 18, 1943, was admised of the nature of this investigation and the identities of the investigating agent and detective. She provided the following information:

On July 17, 1996, she was at the beach near the tampgrounds at Smith Point Park on Fire Island, New York, with her husband GEORGE. At about 8:25 PM, she and her husband had walked to the waters edge in front of camp site number 29. At about 8:40 PM, she noticed something like fireworks or a flare going up from the water. It first appeared to be a fiery orange color. She also noticed white smoke. She then observed a bright brange explosion in the sky about half way up in the sky. She then observed this fireball fall into the sea beyond the horizon. This all occurred to the south and east of her location. It was almost directly south of the Moriches inlet. She recalls thinking to herself "how stupid it is to shoot fireworks from a boat."

PATRICIA NELSON resides at 537 Sleepy Hollow Drive, Morth Shirley, New York. Her home telephone is (516) 924-7227. She is employed by NYNEX at Patchogue, New York. Her work number is 518 890-1592.

Sometime later (time unspecified), he saw a plane coming from west to east and then what looked like a "smaller" plane coming from the northeast on a dead course heading toward the nose of the larger plane. There was no smoke tail on the "smaller plane." Nigosian saw the smaller plane for about 3 or 4 seconds before hearing a crackling sound and saw what looked like aerial bomb fireworks. The larger plane blew up and became a big fireball which then broke into four pieces. Nigosian heard a sound like paper crackling when the "two planes" crunched up, then a noise like "poof," then a whooshing sound. The sun was to the west of the Coast Guard station. Nigosian did see a green light, but this might have been one of the lights from the big plane.

On the way down from the highest point of the arc, it disappeared for a second, and then reappeared as an orange flicker. It stayed there for a moment and then grew into an orange ball. The ball dropped to the horizon in approximately ten to twenty seconds - enough time for TOPPEL, her fiance, and parents to go out on the deck. Approximately one or two seconds after the ball hit the water, TOPPEL heard a boom. After a couple more seconds, TOPPEL heard a second boom, and, after a shorter period of time, a third boom. The first boom was the most intense.

The distance from TOPPEL to the orange ball, and the distance from TOPPEL to the white light, appeared to be the same. The white light appeared to have a door width length tail. (The door used as a reference was approximately 10 feet away and approximately 3 feet wide).

WENK provided the following information:

WENK was standing 40 feet above sea level on the deck of his father's residence located at 161 Dune Road, Westhampton Beach, New York. Also with WENK was his 15-year-old son. The deck overlooks the ocean. WENK observed a tiny, extremely bright orange glow at approximately 10,000 feet high and seven to eight miles to the west, near the Moriches Inlet. The glow descended from west to east. When the glow reached 5,000 feet, it increased in size and generated a trail of flame. At 1,000 feet, the glow and flame became very large. From the initial sighting to this point, approximately 12 seconds had passed. At 1,000 feet, the aircraft was visible. The aircraft's underbelly was faced to the north and the aircraft's wings were extended to the west and east. The nose was down and the tail was at the top. The bottom of the right wing was in immense flames. The underside of the left wing was not in flames, but the top of the wing was in immense flames. The tail was also in flames. WENK did not notice the aircraft engines.

At arms length distance, WENK estimated that the plane became visible five inches from the horizon. At arms length, WENK estimated the height and width of the plane to be five inches. WENK was facing south and advised that the plane ultimately crashed at his 12:00 position. Initially, he believed that it crashed two to five miles south. About 30 seconds after the crash, he heard a "firecracker" type explosion, then an enormous explosion that rocked the house. WENK advised that it was incredibly loud. From the moment WENK observed the plane at 1,000 feet to the crash, he estimated that two seconds had passed. WENK advised that his 15-year-old son, DON WENK III, observed an object spiraling northwest of the initial impact. WENK advised that his son said the object was "definitely" not on fire.

WESTERLAND advised he is a former fireman for the Selden Fire Department. He stated that on Wednesday, July 17, 1996, he was fishing off the second cut on the beach at Smith Point, approximately three miles west of Moriches inlet. stated he arrived there approximately 5:30 pm - 6:00 pm. approximately 8:35 pm - 8:40 pm, as it was just becoming dark, he looked up into the sky and saw the red lights blinking on the side of a plane, and a star in the sky. He stated he then saw an instant burst and flames start coming down from the sky in a mushroom shape. He stated that he did not see any rocket launched, like the radio reported. He said he would have seen it if a missile went off. He stated approximately two seconds after the first explosion, a second burst of flames occurred and flames travelled back upward toward the first burst of flames. He stated he believes this was a result of the unburned fuel. WESTERLAND stated within a matter of seconds, the water was on fire and smoke was in a mushroom shape travelling up into the sky. The smoke was black nearer the water and a white cloud in the sky. WESTERLAND again stated he did not see anything going up toward the plane prior to the explosion.

WESTERLAND stated he did see a small single engine white airplane with a red trim flying very low approximately two - three minutes prior to the plane exploding. He stated the plane was flying so low near him he even waived to the pilot. WESTERLAND described the pilot as a male approximately 40 - 50 years old, chubby, and having light brown hair. He stated the plane flew right over him and he could tell there was only one person in the plane. WESTERLAND stated he has seen planes flying low before, but this was unusual because this airplane had a closed cockpit. He stated it was not an ultra light airplane

He also stated a person named AL "the plumber" was on a boat fishing when the explosion occurred, but he did not know how to reach him. He stated the owner of SMITH POINT BAY AND TACKLE STORE, MIKE, located in Mastic or Shirley, may know how to reach AL "the plumber."

At approximately 8:40 PM, BRAND observed what appeared to be a red flare begin its ascent above the horizon line (half way between the water and the point of explosion). The FLO's path was straight up for approximately three (3) seconds and at a high rate of speed and terminated in a bright white explosion at an rate of speed and terminated in a bright white explosion at an explosion, BRAND described a sheet of flames that fell towards explosion, BRAND described a sheet of flames that fell towards the water which turned to thick black smoke that also descended the water which turned to thick black smoke that also descended the point of explosion and to his left (easterly). After from the point of explosion and to his left (easterly). After BRAND lost sight of the flames below the horizon, he heard four

BRAND advised that he thought the flames landed in the vicinity of Dune Road to his south although his estimate of its distance from him was 7-8 miles. BRAND stated that several small boats (not commercial) and jet ski's were in the water to his front but he said that there was nothing unusual or peculiar. BRAND reiterated that he did not see a point of origin of the FLO in the water and that it appeared to have originated at a distance halfway to the point of explosion. BRAND stated that the FLO was red in color but he was unable to describe any smoke trail.

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JACK CORRAO, 45 Watchogue Avenue, East Moriches, New York, telephone number (516) 873-3714, was interviewed on July 21, 1996 at ABBOTTS HARTS COVE MARINA, INC., 29 Maple Avenue, East Moriches, New York, 11940, telephone number (516) 878-3700. After being advised of the identity of the interviewing agents and the nature of the interview, CORRAO provided the following information:

Approximately 8:20 PM on July 17, 1996, CORRAO returned to his slip at ABBOTTS HARTS COVE MARINA after boating with his wife, ANGELA CORRAO, in Moriches Bay. Soon thereafter, while standing on the dock next to his boat, and looking south of his position, he saw what appeared to be a flare. He could not determine whether the flare was rising up or dropping down. The flare was already in mid-air when he first saw it; he did not see it leave the ground. He does not know whether the flare had a tail, and he is not sure in what direction the flare was traveling. However, he said the flare ended in a big ball of flames. CARRAO did not see a plane before he saw the explosion. CARRAO did not know how long he saw the flare before he saw the explosion. CARRAO is able to describe where the flair was located in the sky when he first saw it, and where in the sky he saw the big ball of flames. CORRAO had no further information.

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ANN D. DECARO was interviewed by an Special Agent (SA) of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). DECARO was advised of the identity of the SA and the purpose of the interview. DECARO thereafter voluntarily provided the following information:

DECARO advised that she and her friend BETTY MANZELLA often enjoy going for a walk together in the evening sometime between 7:00pm to 7:30pm. They would walk the track at a local high school. DECARO advised that they usually walked for approximately one hour. DECARO advised that it is customary that DECARO will drive to MANZELLA's residence pick up MANZELLA and the two of them would drive directly to the track.

Where?

DECARO advised that she recalls on Wednesday evening of this week that she had received a telephone call from her friend BETTY MANZELLA indicating that she would be delayed a little bit, but that she was still interested in going for their walk. DECARO advised that she indicated to MANZELLA telephonically that she would pick her sometime around 7:20pm to 7:30pm that evening. DECARO advised that they usually go walking approximately five or six times per week. Further, that they customarily complete fourteen laps while at the track. DECARO advised that routinely she walks in the inside and her friend BETTY MANZELLA walks on the outside around the track. DECARO advised that as she approached the curve in the track she took notice of an object that was above the tree line in the sky. DECARO further described this object as one that was ascending at a very high rated of speed at the tip was a very bright light with a bright yellowish or orange tail. DECARO advised that she observed this for less than five seconds when she temporarily lost it. She assumed that it was some type of firework display. Within a few seconds her friend BETTY MANZELLA states something to the effect, my God people are dying. DECARO responds to her friend MANZELLA by stating oh no that's fireworks looking up at a bright explosion, the same direction as the previously observed "fireworks." BETTY MANZELLA then explains to ANN D. DECARO that in fact MANZELLA had a few seconds prior to this explosion, viewed an aircraft heading in that direction. Further, that the now fire ball that they were both looking at together was the

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result of a plane exploding. DECARO stated that neither she nor her friend MANZELLA knew the size or type of aircraft that had exploded into flames and came down into the horizon beyond the tree line.

DECARO advised that she did not observe an aircraft and only observed this "bottle racket type missile" ascending from left to right at a very high rate of speed for several seconds prior to losing it. DECARO advised that they both had become so upset with this that they had stopped their walk around the twelfth lap and proceeded to the residence.

At the conclusion of the DECARO interview, BETTY MANZELLA was interviewed. At the conclusion of the MANZELLA interview both DECARO and MANZELLA were transported by the interviewing Agent to the high school track and field area where they had made the observation on Wednesday, July 17, 1996, at approximately 8:30pm.

Facing westbound, BRANDI ELLISTON states that she observed a flare shoot upward from the water, ascend with a bright orange-red glow skyward and at its apex, burst into numerous orange red flames. The flare had a very large orange red tail. ELLISTON advised that her boyfriend, JOHN GANG, JR. also watched the flares ascend.

GANG advised that the flare descended into numerous red flames. Neither heard any noise. ELLISTON believes she was approximately thirty miles away, while GANG believes he was five or six miles away.

On July 21, 1996, PHIL GALANTE and DAVE POLYWODA, 14 Landelion Road, Rocky Point New York, telephone number (516) 744-4972, were interviewed in regards to their complaint call placed to the Trans World Airline (TWA) Flight 800 hotline on July 21, 1996, at 4:20 p.m. (Control Number TW00546).

PHIL GALANTE was the individual who placed the call. He advised that he and his friend observed what could have been a shooting star or a meteorite fall from the sky and explode on the night of July 17, 1996.

During the interview, the first eyewitness, DAVE POLYWODA, advised that they initially saw what they believed to be a falling star. It was not until a couple of hours later, that they heard news reports concerning TWA Flight 800. They then concluded what they saw was the airplane falling from the sky.

POLYWODA recalled the precise time of his sighting 8:38 p.m. When questioned about the accuracy of his memory, he said that he and his friend GALANTE were on their way to dinner and he was very cognizant of time. POLYWODA said that news reports identifying the time of the explosion at 8:40 p.m. triggered his memory.

AGUALLY WAY (=831:10 fr)

POLYWODA and GALANTE were travelling east bound on 25A near the intersection of Wading River Road. GALANTE was driving, POLYWODA was a passenger. No one else was in the car. POLYWODA looked out of the side window and POLYWODA saw a strange light out of the passenger window of the car. He mentioned it to GALANTE. POLYWODE stated that it was falling rapidly from high in the sky at a forty-five (45) degree angle, west to east. He recalled the light to be orange in color and round in shape. He saw it for several seconds. Midway through its fall, the light appeared to stall in mid-air momentarily before exploding in the ball of fire. POLYWODA said that it was a clear night and the flaring light was clearly visible.

Both interviewees believed that what they saw was TWA Flight 800 falling in flames, and they were adamant that this event could not have been caused by a missile, even though they offered no factual basis for their conclusion.


During the phone complaint, GALANTE stated that the plane exploded at about 7,000 feet. He admitted during the interview that this was a rough guess and he had no way of knowing the actual altitude.

GALANTE's phone complaint also seemed to indicate that he saw something strike the plane. During the interview, both GALANTE and POLYWODA were questioned extensively about these details. POLYWODA strongly disagreed with his friend, stating that what he saw was just one object apparently TWA Flight 800 falling in flames and exploding. GALANTE ultimately agreed with is friend. GALANTE initially thought he may have seen a meteor falling and hitting something in the sky causing an explosion.

Both agreed that they did not see anything moving from the ground, like a missile, to intercept an aircraft. They only saw a <u>light falling from high in the sky</u>. Both are agreeable to being recontracted.

GALLAGHER resides at 57 Pinewood Drive, Shirley, New York (NY) 11967 and her home telephone number is (516) 281-0383. GALLAGHER is employed at the Shirley, NY, branch of Key Bank, telephone number (516) 399-3100.

On the evening of Wednesday, July 17, 1996, GALLAGHER was on the beach at Smith Point just east of the boardwalk with her husband and children when she observed a huge "fireball" grow from a black/silvery dot in the sky. GALLAGHER was at the water's edge looking out over the ocean at the time of the occurrence. GALLAGHER watched as the red/orange fireball, which appeared to be momentarily suspended in one spot, began to fall toward the ocean. The fireball was outlined in black. Approximately, one-half of the distance from the horizon to the explosion spot in the sky, the fireball broke into two pieces; one pencil or telephone shaped, and one shaped like a circle. Both pieces continued to fall toward the ocean with the larger pencil-shaped piece falling slightly ahead of the smaller circular-shaped piece. The two pieces were both encircled in flames and close together. GALLAGHER described them as "puzzle pieces that were separate but together."

GALLAGHER watched until the flaming pieces hit the surface of the ocean, the larger piece hitting a second or two before the smaller piece. Approximately 5-10 seconds later, GALLAGHER observed a white "flare" type of light rise from the right (west) side of where the two flaming pieces impacted the ocean. The "flare" was pink on the outside and white on the inside. The "flare" appeared to be followed by a black trail of smoke and arced to the east before fading out.

The fishing boat was in the water which GIORDANO described as being just north of the west cut of Moriches Inlet. ARTERO drew GIORDANO's attention to something in the sky. GIORDANO looked up and saw a "big flare," as well as a gray or ash-colored substance above the "flare". GIORDANO thought the object looked like a flare because of his experiences in Vietnam. The object then descended and split into two flames. One flame was oblong-shaped, while the other was round. GIORDANO did not hear any loud noises associated with the object. He and his companions continued fishing in the inlet until they saw Coast Guard boats on the ocean.

GIORDANO had not consumed any alcohol while in the fishing boat. He stated that he does not travel in a boat while under the influence of alcohol.

On July 21, 1996, LCUIS GEX, 339 Dune Road, Westhampton, New York, (516) 288-7013, was advised of the identity of the interviewing agenc, and provided the following information:


GEX explained that he is an ex-Air Force pilot, who has flown in combat.

About 8:38 p.m. to 8:48 p.m. on July 17, 1996, GEX and his wife EVELYN were sitting on the couch of their beach house watching television. The back windows of the house look right over the water and are in a south by southeast direction.

GEX heard a loud explosion which actually shook the house. The loud explosion was followed by several smaller explosions.

Approximately one minut to a minute and one-half later, while looking out the back window, GEX saw a large red globe of fire fall very slowly from the sky. GEX estimated that it took at least 30 seconds for the fireball to fall. Although GEX did not actually see it, there was a final explosion as the falling object presumably hit the water.

GEX's vantage point was facing south out over the ocean. GEX did add that the explosion sounded like a "SAM 7" missile hitting a plane, followed by smaller explosions that sounded as if smaller munitions were "cooking off."

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

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On July 21, 1996, Special Agent (SA) WILLIAM F. LYNCH Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), interviewed Mr. ALFRED LINKE, a white male, Date of Birth (DOB) March 26, 1953, Social Security Account Number (SSAN) 091-44-8912. Mr. LINKE resides at 56 Probst Drive, Shirley, New York, (516) 281-4524, and is employed by SWEZEY FUEL OIL COMPANY, Patchogue, New York, (516) 475-0270, extension 116. Mr. LINKE was interviewed regarding his observations concerning the crash of Trans World Airline (TWA) Flight 800, on July 17, 1996. He advised as follows:

#### OBSERVATIONS OF ALFRED LINKE:

On July 17, 1996, at approximately 8:25 p.m., Mr. LINKE and two friends were fishing for striped bass, approximately one mile off shore, from Great Gun Beach, Town of Brookhaven, Long Island, New York. He described his boat as a twenty-four (24) foot PROLINE center console type and named his friends as ANTHONY FARRANTELLO of Patchogue, New York, and LOUIS FIGLUIZZI, of Patchogue, New York.

The night was clear and while it was dusk, there was considerable daylight left. Visibility was excellent, and the sea was calm.

Mr. LINKE stated after departing his marina in Shirley, New York, he and his two friends fished in several positions in the vicinity of Moriches Inlet, East Moriches, New York.

By 8:25 p.m., Mr. LINKE's boast the "BAYSICK" was positioned, unanchored and drifting, approximately one mile off shore from Great Gun Beach, Town of Brookhaven.

LINKE continued that at approximately 8:25 p.m., he first sighted what he thought might be a shooting star, moving in a downward, forty-five (45) degree sloping arc, and added that it was taking a northward turn, and appeared to be heading toward his boat. He described this light as yellow in color, and noted that it got progressively brighter and larger. He also noted that it was moving very fast, and he began to be concerned that it was heading toward him.

As soon as he noted it, he exclaimed to his two friends, "Look at this," or words to that effect. At this same moment, he realized this object was an airplane, although he had no idea what type or size.

Mr. LINKE continued that almost at the same instant that he identified the object as an airplane, he noted that it had rolled over onto it's left side, and seemed to be hooking northward and downward.

Immediately, the entire right wing separated from the fuselage, and peeled back, alongside the fuselage. Mr. LINKE emphasized that the entire wing was intact as it separated, and stated that he did not see any engine pods on it. He added, however, that this may have been because he was viewing only the top of the right wing.

#### A FIRE STARTS:

LINKE stated that at the instant the wing separated, a large "fire trail" erupted, which he described as a roaring, rushing sound, and added that he immediately felt a concussion on his chest when this happened. The separated wing disappeared into this fire trail.

The plane now dropping sharply, separated into two parts, being the right wing and the rest of the plane, dropped about one mile, and then hit the water as two separate pieces. As the two pieces hit the water a large curtain of water arose and Mr. LINKE then saw black smoke coming from the impact area. At this point, Mr. LINKE still had no idea of the type or size of the plane, and never did see any markings on it.

Mr. LINKE stated that he became very excited and used his boat's radio to exclaim "MAYDAY" several times to the United States Coast Guard (USCG), and then transmitted "This is the BAYSICK....I want to report an aerial burst and whatever it is crashed into the ocean."

Mr. LINKE then drove his boat toward the fire and got about five (5) miles from the surface fire, having travelled approximately four (4) nautical miles. At this point, he could see surface ablaze, and while he considered going further toward it, decided against this, because he was low on fuel. He did, however, call the USCG again, to report that the "Water was on fire!" before returning to Moriches Inlet.



Upon entering the inlet, LINKE heard radio traffic from other responding boats, which mentioned "many bodies" in the water.

The next day, July 18, 1996, Mr. LINKE again phoned the Coast Guard to identify himself as the "MAYDAY" caller from the night before. He recalled that the Coast Guardsman he reached was, in fact, the same man to whom he had made his "MAYDAY" call, and added that the man remembered him, and took his (LINKE's) name and phone number.

During this interview, Senior Investigator JOHN F. CASSINO, New York State Police, and the Queens District Attorney's Office was also present.

Detective STANLEY PAWLOSKI, Suffolk County Police Department (SCPD) a Police Artist, also reviewed Mr. LINKE's observations with him, and based upon them, rendered a sketch of what Mr. LINKE saw. That sketch is attached.

BETTY MANZELLA was interviewed by an Special Agent (SA) of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. MANZELLA was advised of the identity of the SA and the purpose of the interview.

MANZELLA thereafter voluntarily provided the following information:

MANZELLA advised that she is friends with ANN D. DECARO also of Shirley, Long Island and that the two women enjoyed walking in the evening at a local high school. MANZELLA advised that they tried to get there every night of the week, however, usually its four or five times per weeks. MANZELLA further advised that usually between 7:00pm and 7:30pm they would depart via ANN DECARO vehicle picking up BETTY MANZELLA at her residence and drive directly to the high school track. MANZELLA advised that they usually walked for an hour completing approximately MANZELLA advised that they departed a little on fourteen laps. the late side on Wednesday, July 17, 1996, due to a commitment she had of picking up her son. MANZELLA advised that to the best of her recollection that it was probably somewhere in the vicinity of twenty minutes to eight or a quarter to eight that ANN DECARO had picked her (MANZELLA) up at her residence to depart for the high school.

MANZELLA advised that her friend ANN DECARO walks on the inside and she walks on the outside. As they were walking around the track on lap number 12 to the best of her recollection she noticed a plane the reason that she took notice of the plane was because the sun reflected off of it. MANZELLA advised that after first noticing the plane she did not maintained eye contact with it for approximately thirty seconds. MANZELLA advised that as she came to the curve in the track she noticed a large bright light and she remembered saying something to the effect oh my God people are dying. MANZELLA was positive that the bright light explosion was from the aircraft that she had just observed a few seconds before.

MANZELLA recalls that her friend ANN DECARO stated something to the effect "oh no that was fireworks." At the conclusion of this interview BETTY MANZELLA accompanied by her friend ANN DECARO were transported by the interviewing agent to the high school track and field area where they both walked through their description of what they had observed on Wednesday evening July 17, 1996, at approximately 8:30pm.

Dr. PAOLETTA stated he was returning home from dinner on July 17, 1996, at approximately 8:30 PM, Dr. PAOLETTA had travelled by his boat, "R&R," with his wife Dr. DONNA BROWN (PAOLETTA), brother-in-law KENNETH BROWN, and BROWN's wife CORINNE. Their three children were below deck.

PAOLETTA's boat was positioned in Moriches Bay just south and slightly west of Beaver Dam Creek, at the mouth of the canal.

PAOLETTA advised he was heading slowly north towards Beaver Dam Creek, which is where he docks his boat. PAOLETTA was actually sitting on the water maneuvering the boat. As PAOLETTA turned around, me saw a large fireball in the sky which split or exploded in two separate fireballs with black smoke. The fireballs took a path that looked like an inverted Y () PAOLETTA stated the first fireball looked like a red/orange sun setting.

Immediately following, PAOLETTA called the United States Coast Guard (USCG) to report what they saw, stating it appeared as though a plane was in trouble. The USCG responded stating the military was conducting pyrotechnique exercises and would this have been what they saw? PAOLETTA responded that they were not sure; however, they then heard two other boats call in similar reports to the USCG. One boat, "EQUITY" was positioned out on the ocean. The other boat, whose name PAOLETTA could not recall, was in the Shinnecock Inlet.

PAOLETTA went back on his boat to the exact spot he was at on July 17, 1996 at the time of the incident and obtained the following coordinates:



QUIGLEY was advised of the identities of the interviewing agents and the nature of the interview, which was to ascertain her knowledge and observations during the evening hours of July 17, 1996. Thereafter, QUIGLEY provided the following information:

At approximately 8:20 pm on July 17, 1996. QUIGLEY was parked in her Ford Aerostar automobile on Mile Hill Road, at the shore of the Northwest Bay, East Hampton, New York. QUIGLEY was looking out over the Bay in a general south, southwesterly direction. QUIGLEY had a vague recollection regarding the following observations which occurred approximately 30 - 40 miles away.

QUIGLEY observed a fine, pencil thin white light. This white light extended upward in the sky and was viewed as a fine white line. This white line had a more definitive head and a less definitive smokey line. This white line extended upward in an arc shape at approximately 70 degrees from approximately 2 - 5 vertical degrees over the horizon and extending to 20 degrees above the horizon. The line emanated wispy effects trailing off the east side. This fine white line travelled in a north, northwesterly direction. The fine white line was in the sky for approximately three (3) seconds. As the line extended upwards and began to arc, the tail began to dissipate.



QUIGLEY's recollections regarding the next series of M47 observations are more clear in her mind. The fine thin line at 20 degrees off the horizon became a brilliant, bright white light which quickly traveled into a star-shaped light radiating rays of white light. This transformation occurred in a split-second at which time it became a bright red/orange ball of fire. This red/orange light began to cascade in an arc-shape downward toward the horizon. The cascade of red/orange light arched slightly

upward before flowing straight down toward the horizon. The cascade of red/orange light was interrupted, seeming to dissipate at five (5) degrees above the horizon than quickly resumed as red/orange falling out of view on the horizon. The direction of this cascade was northwesterly.

The cascade of red/orange light was of considerable size and width, described as a puffy, thick, fireball. A second red/orange cascade of light emanating from that same 20 degree point arched in a similar manner to the north, northeast, falling toward the horizon after a slight upward movement similar to the larger, thicker cascade of light. The smaller cascade of red/orange light was approximately one-sixth (1/6) the thickness of the larger cascade of red/orange light. The pinnacle of both arches was the initial white, bright light.

QUIGLEY did not hear any noise associated with the events surrounding the observation of these lights. The initial fine white/greyish line was less than five (5) degrees off the horizon overlooking Barcelona Neck. The line travelled approximated three (3) seconds. The total time of these light observations from the initial sighting of the fine white/greyish line to the cascade of red/orange cascade vanishing into the horizon was approximately two (2) seconds. The initial fine white line curved slightly, leveling off with the horizon before transforming into the bright, burst of white light. The direction of the initial fine white line was from the west, northwest.

QUIGLEY saw no specific objects associated with her observations of the lights. The lights were more than 30 miles away. The entire series of events and observations encompassed approximately twenty (20) degrees vertical of QUIGLEY's field of vision.



QUIGLEY was advised to attempt to retain these observations in her mind and possibly sketch her observation in case it becomes necessary to specifically recall these details and observations in the future. QUIGLEY indicated that she would recontact the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) if she recalls any additional observations regarding the events surrounding the aforementioned observation.

WELCOM stated he initially thought the orange glow might have been a flare from a boat. WELCOM advised he did not actually see a flare projected from a boat. WELCOM advised he took his eye off the glow for a second or two looking for a boat. t noting any boat, WELCOM returned his glace to the glow still the sky.

WELCOM stated he returned his vision to the orange glow, which he viewed for an additional second or two. WELCOM advised he now noted a flash developed from the area of the glow. The flash then became a more noticeable fire or explosion. Two distinct separate pieces of fiery material began dropping to the ocean. WELCOM advised, he initially believed there was a mid-air collision between two aircraft because of the two separate fiery materials. WELCOM advised he continued to view the two fiery pieces until it fell into the ocean.



She added that it was a dark, clear, night. She reiterated that she saw one burst of light and then one piece falling. She said she did not see an airplane.

Curro was interviewed by Special Agents Peter C. Casazza and Paul Shea of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). Also present during the interview was Deputy Inspector Douglas Matulewich, Suffolk County Police Department (SCPD), Commanding Officer of the Marine Bureau; Robert Doherty and Thomas LeBlanc, Analysts, Missile and Space Intelligence Center, Redstone Arsenal, Alabama.

### Curro's Observations:

Curro related that on the evening of July 17, 1996, at approximately 8:45PM, he was in a boat immediately to the west side of the Ponquogue Bridge, looking south at the barrier island when he noticed something out of the corner of his eye.

Curro described what he saw as a red glow in the southwest, going straight up for approximately three (3) seconds. Then there was what he described as a separation in this red glow as it reached its highest point; a red flame then went upward from the red glow.

After the glow went out, what remained was black smoke with white smoke on top of the black smoke.

Curro then heard two (2) big booms about twenty-five (25) seconds later; one after the other.

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Curro related that this whole occurrence must have been far away, because the entire event was low on the horizon, approximately at eye level.

## Position and compass readings taken:



HEINRICH said that he and a small group of friends were standing on the dock on the bayside of the Great Gun Beach Dock at Fire Island. HEINRICH's group was looking over the dunes at the ocean.

HEINRICH said his friend, TONY LORIE (Phonetic), who is a private pilot, told him to look up into the sky at a red flare that was ascending into the sky at 8:30 PM, on July 17, 1996.

HEINRICH said he and LORIE watched the flare for approximately ten (10) seconds.

HEINRICH said they did not see the plane at this point.

A couple of seconds later, they saw what they thought was the explosion of a parachute flare but quickly realized that due to the size of the flames it was definitely not a flare descending to the ground. HEINRICH said he did not see the plane land but he knew that other people were going to attempt to find out what had happened.

HEINRICH said he has no military experience and does not feel one way or another if it was any kind of missile.

HEINRICH said it seemed like the flare was only a mile or two away from him but later he learned it was about six-eight (6-8) miles away.



BRIAN KIRCHNER and DOUG FLYNN were telephonically interviewed pertaining to the night of July 17, 1996. KIRCHNER and FLYNN contacted the New York Office of the FBI relative to what they saw while boating on July 17, 1996. According to KIRCHNER and FLYNN, they were with three other individuals at approximately 8 o'clock on Wednesday evening, July 17, 1996. They were surfing by Great Gun beach in Moriches Bay west of the Moriches inlet. At approximately 8:30 KIRCHNER and FLYNN stated that the visibility was pretty good and it was just about dusk. They saw what appeared to be a flare being fired from a boat inthe bay. They stated that the flare did not appear to be an ordinary flare, and it could have been something like a fireworks, but the burst at the end of the flare seemed pretty unusual. It was not a normal boat flare that they are used to. They said the flare disappeared into black smoke behind a dune and it burst pretty low over the horizon. The boat that these individuals thought that the flare came from was a Pro-line center console occupied by two males white, thirty years of age. This boat was approximately two hundred yards away from KIRCHNER and FLYNN while they were surfing, but they could not tell how far away it was from them when they saw the flare being fired. They said these males did not appear to be fishing and seemed to just be sitting in the boat.

Both KIRCHNER and FLYNN stated that another unusual incident occurred approximately 8 o'clock that night, when a small single engine plane (perhaps yellow in color) flew west approximately fifty feet over the water and then disappeared. Approximately twenty minutes later at about 8:20 p.m. the plane came back from the other direction again very low over the water.

Both KIRCHNER and FLYNN stated that when the flare (or what appeared to be a flare) burst they did not hear or see any other explosion or burst of light. It wasn't until they got home that they heard about the TWA disaster. KIRCHNER and flynn stated that when they saw this flare go up they were pulling away from the dock on the bay side of the barrier beach. All the passengers in the boat were sitting facing south and the boat was

On July 22, 1996, BILL LAGATTOLLA, 21A Crystal Beach Eculevard, Moriches, New York, Telephone Number (516) 874-4238, was advised of the identities of the interviewing Agents and the purpose of the interview. LAGATTOLLA then provided the following information:

On Tuesday evening, July 16, 1996, the night before the crash of TWA Flight 800, at approximately 8:15PM or 8:30PM, LAGATTOLLA was walking along Rogers Beach on Dune Road in Westhampton when he saw a bright white flash that frightened him and was at horizon level southwest of the beach over the ocean. LAGATTOLLA was facing west and was walking west on the beach at the time of the flash. When he saw the flash, he was near the second jetty approximately 1.5 miles west of the Rogers Pavilion Beach House.

He described the flash as white in color, round in shape and lasting for approximately one second or almost instantaneous. He further advised that he did not hear any sounds before or after the flash. The flash was "tunnel-like" and withdrew.

LAGATTOLLA waited to see if there would be a second flash but saw nothing else. He further advised that about twenty minutes prior to seeing the white flash, he observed a helicopter flying from the west to the east along the coastline. LAGATTOLLA could not provide any further information.

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On July 22, 1996, at 1:30 P.M. Investigator JOHN P. KEARY interviewed STACEY LAHEY (nee POOLE), Date of Birth July 20, 1996 of 28 Rolling Ridge Road, White Plains, New York, 10605, 914-328-0635. She has a summer home located at 38 Bay Crest Avenue, Westhampton, New York, 516-288-6941. She was telephonically interviewed at her residence.

LAHEY advised that on July 17 1996 at approximately 8:30 P.M. she was having dinner at the Dune Deck Hotel which is located on Dune Road, Westhampton, New York. She was eating in STARRBOGGS RESTAURANT which is located at the site: She was seated facing the ocean. Her table was the second from the window, and also second from the west wall. She noticed a large burst of flame occur out on the ocean due south of her location. This burst of fire fell from the sky in a west to east fashion. She heard five loud booms thereafter. She saw no object ascending into the sky prior to this. She estimated the distance as being 10 miles away.

LAHEY advised that about 15 minutes prior to the blast a small Cessna type plane flew past her location. This plane was flying low over the surf from the east to the west.

MEYER then furnished the following information:

On July 17, 1996, MEYER was fishing off of a boat in Moriches Inlet with JAMES LOHSE and JOSE, aka JOE ROSARIO. Between 8:20 pm and 8:30 pm, the boat was located in the northern portion of the inlet when MEYER observed what appeared to be a flare with an orange ball at its head. MEYER observed the flare like object (FLO) for eight to ten seconds at which time it turned into a bright yellowish orange glow. This glow turned into a wide flame that descended towards the ocean in two pieces, where MEYER lost sight of it beyond the horizon. Several minutes after losing sight of the explosion MEYER smelled a fuel like odor which was different than any he recognized.

Approximately 20 minutes prior to the explosion MEYER observed a large orange rust colored boat, 250-300 feet in length with large arm like structures on its rear, south of Moriches Inlet. MEYER thought this was unusual because large commercial fishing boats are rarely that close to the inlet. MEYER did not observe any aircraft in the area because of the low light conditions.

POLICASTRO described the top of the flare as a little ball, orange/pink in color. The flare left behind a smoke trail which was bluish/gray in color. The smoke trail behind the flair like vapor or gas. The smoke trail immediately behind the flair was darker but also blue/gray and seemed to be streaming out from behind the flare. The smoke trail was consistent in its color, density and thickness.

The flare rose upward and then arced downward. The time it took to reach the top of the arc was approximately five seconds. The flare descended from the arc for approximately one second exploded into an orange ball. POLICASTRO said the explosion seemed to move out and down splitting into six orange pieces which fell straight down trailing black smoke behind them.



PRIVITAR is a New York City Fireman (Ladder number 49, 1-718-430-0268) and a volunteer fireman for East Moriches. He was on duty at the Coast Guard Station at the time of the interview.

PRIVITAR advised that on the night of July 17, 1996, he and his son, JAMIE, launched his boat from the Maple Avenue boat launch in East Moriches circa 8:20 PM. He was just taking the boat out for a test run. Around 8:30 PM, they were in Moriches Bay, not far from the Coast Guard Station, heading in the direction of Fire Island. PRIVITAR noticed a bright light in the sky. He looked up and noticed that a column of smoke went from the bright light down to the ground or water. PRIVITAR stopped his boat to watch, and a few seconds later, the bright light became more intense and broke into two fire balls as it fell. PRIVITAR drew his son's attention to this sight. He told his son it looked as if a propane tank had blown up.

PRIVITAR and his son headed toward Fire Island, expecting to see something burning on the ground. Based on the location of the column of smoke, PRIVITAR thought that the problem originated on Fire Island. When he saw no fire, he turned his boat around and went over to another, larger boat. He inquired there as to whether or not there had been any radio broadcasts explaining what he had seen. Someone in the other boat advised that a news report had just been issued about a plane going down.

PRIVITAR described the light that he first saw as being white-orange in color. It then grew more intense in brightness and broke up into two, red balls of fire.

PRIVITAR said that the column of smoke resembled a trail left by something being shot up into the sky. He did not see anything moving from the ground upward, but when he say the light and the explosion, he concluded the smoke came to something being shot upward. 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ANTHONY RUVOLO was telephonically contacted at his place of employment, MEYERS PARKING, telephone number (212) 736-8233. After being advised of the official identity of the contacting Agent and the nature of the interview, RUVOLO provided the following information:

On July 17, 1996, at between 8:30 PM and 8:40 PM, RUVOLO was out in his boat, fishing with his wife, when he saw what he thought to be a flare fly into the air to his southeast side over the ocean. When the "flare" reached its highest point a bright orange fireball erupted. That fireball then fell, fluttering back and forth, into the ocean. When he made these observations, RUVOLO was located approximately three (3) miles east of the Fire Island Inlet on the bay side of Fire Island in the vicinity of Ocean Beach. He launched his boat from a private dock in Bayshore, New York.

He described the "flare" as glowing red and stated that it rose "straight up" from the ocean and was in flight for approximately ten (10) seconds. 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
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

SHAW was not sure what their heading was enroute to JFK, but felt that they were flying over a Long Island Beach and were headed generally in a westerly direction. She seemed to vaguely recall that the pilot referenced an approximate distance of six miles and she believed his reference to be from the coast line to the "flare".

SHAW advised that it was dusk, with a "lovely sunset" occurring out her right window. Out the right side of the aircraft she recalls some cumulus clouds and to the left, everything appeared to be clear. The area around Manhattan was quite hazy though. SHAW advised that there were several other aircraft in the area but did not know if they were depicted on the aircraft radar scope. She did note that one of the aircraft called out by center was "too close" just prior to the "flare" incident.

BRUMLEY was on board US Air Flight 217 from Charlotte, North Carolina to Providence, Rhode Island at approximately 8:25 pm on July 17, 1996. BRUMLEY was seated in seat 5-F, positioned in the right front portion of the aircraft. Flight 217 was travelling in a north-northwest direction, at an unknown altitude. BRUMLEY overheard a flight attendant say something about 15,000 feet, but he is unsure if she was referring specifically to the altitude of Flight 217 at that specific time.

At 8:25 pm it was already getting dark outside, as the sun had already set to the left side of the plane (opposite where BRUMLEY was seated). It was not yet completely dark, however, as BRUMLEY could distinguish the distinctively light color of the shoreline as it contrasted the ocean. The shoreline was at approximately a 1:00 position with reference to BRUMLEY's field of view.

plane when he noticed a small airplane flying across their flight CAJ USE TO path, just approximately 500 to 700 feet below them. This caught SET CLOCK BRUMLEY's attention because of the relatively close proximity of that airplane to Flight 217. The second fireball was accompanied by billowing smoke containing both dark and light colored regions. BRUMLEY continued to watch the fireball as it appeared to descend towards the water. However, simultaneous with the fireball's impact with the water, Flight 217 flew over the top of it and BRUMLEY lost his view.

The explosion was from far enough of a distance away that the brightness of it did not affect BRUMLEY's eyes, even to the point of causing him to blink.

BRUMLEY never observed any smoke trail whatsoever. The flare-like projectile seemingly appeared out of nowhere and consisted only of one very defined burning point of bright white light. The path of the projectile appeared to be straight. No red or orange flame was associated with it and no plume of fire was trailing behind it. Nothing fell away from the projectile as he observed it. BRUMLEY did not observe a launch site, nor did he hear any sounds associated with what he saw.

JOHNSON looked to her right, to the southwest, and saw huge flare that came from the water, went up and exploded, and flames came down. They heard a deep, boom-boom-boom-boom sound and then the ground shook. She saw fire on the water and black smoke, and she thought a ship was on fire.

JOHNSON recounted the events as follows: she thought the "flare" rose from the water, and at first thought it was a distress signal. It was "way too big", and it seemed miles away. She guessed it was in flight for "seconds". She saw grey smoke and white smoke behind the "flare". It was grey at first, then the smoke changed to white. There was a bright orange glow at the leading edge of the smoke.

She could not say there was an initial puff of smoke. She did not see an object, just an orange-red-yellow flame, mostly orange, followed by smoke. She did not remember an object falling away, but only remembered two flames coming down afterward.

She did not hear the "flare" go up, but only heard the "sound of thunder" afterward. She recalled the outside light was still pretty good, at dusk, with a grey sky that night.

The trail of the "flare" was curved as the "flare" flew up vertically. There was an explosion and two pieces of flame were coming down, like a plume. The first piece was bigger, and the one in the back peeled away and was not as big.



GEORGE KALAMARES, Firefighter, 106 Air National Guard, 55 Perch Tree Lane, Mount Sinai, New York, telephone number (516) 474-0503, beeper number (516) 442-3111, was contacted at his residence. He was advised of the identities of the interviewing agents and that the purpose of the interview was to gather information regarding the crash of Trans World Airline (TWA) Flight 800. He then provided the following information:

On July 17, 1996, at approximately 8:35 PM, KALAMARES noticed a silver-colored line descending through the sky. A fireball then appeared approximately one (1) mile high. The fireball rotated from right to left as it fell through the night sky. At one point, a "blow torch" like flame shot out horizontally from the descending fireball, lasting only a few seconds. No smoke, sound or any other unusual activity was bserved before the fireball.

KALAMARAS was fishing with a friend off the Blue Point dock facing east. The sun was ging down and the daylight turning to dusk.

DIMITRA KAPSOS, Date of Birth March 2, 1951, was contacted by Special Agent PETER C. CASAZZA and Detective GERARD KIRK, 5th Squad, Suffolk County Police Department, regarding her observations of an explosion she witnessed in the sky over the ocean on the evening of July 17, 1996.

KAPSOS' OBSERVATIONS

KAPSOS related that she was visiting her in-laws at a summer condo they rented at 575 Dune Road, Westhampton Beach, New York, telephone number (516) 288-1439.

On the evening of July 17, 1996 at approximately 8:30 PM, she was walking out the sliding glass door onto the deck which overlooks the ocean when she noticed something in the sky. She then saw a huge fireball, which was a brilliant orange and red color with gray edges around it. Then there was another smaller second fireball.

Within a few seconds, she heard two large booms which large distinct smoke streaks falling to the ocean surface.

The streaks turned into a circular smoke column which eventually disappeared. At the top of the column was a small gray and white cloud.

In a matter of minutes after the fireball hit the water boats could be seen heading out in that direction. Then a helicopter could be seen headed out a while later.

When the fireball reached the ocean surface, some irregular lights could be seen coming from the surface, which moved along the surface in groups. This lasted for a few hours.


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


On July 23, 1996, responded to Captree State Park and interviewed ALFRED P. LANDOLFI, Date of Birth (DOB) September 25, 1971, of 2 Cleveland Street, Islip Terrace, New York, phone (516) 224-1669. LANDOLFI is employed as a Charter Boat Mate on the Speedy Express and stated that following:

On July 17, 1996, at about 8:00 PM, the aforesaid boat left the boat basin to go blue fishing in the ocean. Upon arrival in Fire Island Inlet, the boat took a compass heading of about 225 degrees southwest and continued to travel to their intended fishing grounds. While the boat was about three to five (3 to 5) miles from the inlet and approximately 3 miles from shore (placing the boat somewhere between Fire Island Inlet and Jones Inlet). LANDOLFI, who was sitting on the upper deck of the boat looked to the south. It was about 8:20 PM, and he observed an airplane traveling in an easterly direction. The plane was located approximately two to three (2 to 3) miles south of their boat. LANDOLFI stated he noted that the plane was glowing red and orange to the rear of its nose and extended all the way to the tail section. He drew this to the attention of the other mate named JOHN RADZICKI of Lindenhurst, New York. LANDOLFI claimed he watched the plane continue to fly for about a half of a minute to a minute. LANDOLFI lost view of the plane as it came across the post side of the captains pilot-house and he did not attempt to observe it any longer because other than the glow of the plane there did not seem to be any other thing unusual about the plane which he considered to be cruising at less than two miles in altitude. LANDOLFI stated after hearing about the plane crash he was sure that it must of crashed due to some sort of mechanical failure, due to the fact that it had been glowing red for the entire time he viewed it. LANDOLFI stated he did not see any flares in the sky or hear any explosion that night.

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CHARLES LE BRUN, Date of Birth, May 29, 1951, was interviewed at his residence, 33 Woodland Avenue, East Moriches, New York, telephone number (516) 878-3040. After being advised of the identities of the interviewing Agents and the nature of the interview, LE BRUN provided the following information:

LE BRUN is an Assistant Fire Chief for the Air National Guard. On the evening of July 17, 1996, LE BRUN was traveling by boat to Moneybogue Bay en route to LARRY's CRAB HOUSE for dinner, which is near the United States Coast Guard Station. LE BRUN was traveling with his girlfriend, LISA KEEGAN.

LE BRUN was neading due south in Moneybogue Bay and approached the first red buoy marker. At this marker, LE BRUN would have started to bear westbound within Moneybogue Bay on his approach through the Jessup Lane Bridge. LE BRUN was traveling at less than five miles per hour in compliance with the "no wake" law.

Just as LE BRUN reached the first red buoy marker, at about the center of Moneybogue Bay, while facing due south, he saw what appeared to be a boat flare shoot straight up into the sky from the horizon beyond Dune Road. LE BRUN advised that it was still light outside, and his initial thought was that it was either a boat flare or fireworks. Because it arose from south of Dune Road, LE BRUN knew that it originated from the ocean.

He turned to his girlfriend, LISA KEEGAN, and asked her to look. The flare was yellow-orange in color and shaped like a round ball. There was no tail of smoke on the flare. LE BRUN who is familiar with boat flares, advised that the flare ascended at the normal speed of a boat flare. The flare ascended straight up into the sky. It did not arc or curve.

The flare ascended for what LE BRUN estimated to be about fifteen seconds. It then burst into a yellow flash, slightly larger than the flare itself. LE BRUN thought that the yellow flash looked a little like "heat lightning". The yellow flash remained illuminated and descended. It

then burst again into a huge fireball, yellow-orange in color. This second fireball was about twenty times the size of the yellow flash.

LE BRUN did not hear any sounds as the flare ascended, or when the yellow flash and the huge fireball appeared. The fireball descended and eventually LE BRUN lost visual contact as it descended south of Dune road. LE BRUN heard three explosions after he lost visual contact. LE BRUN estimated that the entire event took about thirty seconds.

At about the same time that he lost visual contact, LE BRUN saw a National Guard helicopter traveling from northeast to the south in the direction of the fire. The helicopter headed south into the ocean over the Beach Lane draw bridge.

LE BRUN offered to revisit the exact point at which he saw the flare.

The interviewing Agents accompanied LE BRUN to his 23 foot boat to the point where he saw the flare. LE BRUN stopped the boat at the first red buoy which is marked number 4, located in the center of the Moneybogue Bay. The buoy is the point at which boats would begin to make their bearings westbound in order to travel through the Jessup Lane Bridge and into Moriches Bay.

LE BRUN pointed his boat in the direction in which he saw the flare. The compass reading was 173 degrees south. The direction which LE BRUN pointed was about one quarter of a mile east of the Jessup Lane Bridge.

LE BRUN advised that his girlfriend, LISA KEEGAN, will be available tomorrow to be interviewed. She works at the RABBIT'S FOOT in Center Moriches, telephone number (516) 874-9162, between 10:00 am and 6:00 pm.

WILLIAM MEHL, 12 Gehring Road Extension, Tolland, Connecticut, telephone number 860-875-9349, was advised of the identity of the interviewing Agent and the nature of the interview. MEHL then furnished the following information:

On 7/17/96 at approximately 8:30pm, while fishing on his boat, a Starcraft, 23 foot outboard, with JEFFERY VAMOUDEMHOVE and ROBERT GRUNBERG in the Long Laland sound, approximately four miles due north of Plum Island and Nyanick Bay, saw what he thought to be a "parachute flare". Rising from the land into the sky above him.

MEHL described the flare that looked like a comet, with a red fire ball and a red tail. Seconds later MEHL saw one huge explosion, occurring approximately 30 miles north east of them.

MEHL stated that the time frame from the comet-like flare till the explosion lasted no more than 10 to 15 seconds. He heard no noise.

MEHL estimated the flare could have possibly come from Shelter Island or the "sound" side of Long Island.

MEHL noted that he has been fishing at night in the Long Island sound for at least 12 years and has never seen a flare discharged.

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



TORRANCE, her three (3) children, her friend, KRISTI JOHNSON, home telephone: (860) 675-1116, residing in Avon, Connecticut, and JOHNSON's two (2) children, arrived at Ponquoque Beach, across from the Shinnecock, NY Coast Guard Station, at approximately 8:00 pm. All seven (7) individuals were at the water's edge to the right of the lifeguard station located directly in front of the concession stand. She advised that there were approximately 10 to 15 people on the beach. It was hazy and humid and she does not remember seeing the sun due to the haze.

Shortly thereafter, JOHNSON told TORRANCE to look toward the right, which was in a westerly direction from her location. At a position approximately two o'clock from where she was standing, TORRANCE saw a red streak, which was comprised of red and orange flames and resembled a plant called a cattail. The streak was thick and trailed white smoke. She did not see any solid objects in the smoke and fire, but it reminded her of the Challenger disaster. Almost immediately she saw a second streak, which resembled the first. She thought that the streaks were flares or fireworks but something did not seem right. She cannot remember if the first streak was traveling up but got the impression that it was a flare coming up from the ocean because she vaguely remembers smoke on the water. However, it was hazy and she cannot be sure if it was haze on the water or smoke.

TORRANCE advised the first streak was smaller than the second and was lower and to the left of the second streak. Both streaks initially traveled in a straight line, then fell to the 25028-SUB water trailing white smoke. A mushroom shaped cloud 557441250028-SUB from the water after impact

TORRANCE is not sure, but within two (2) minutes she heard three (3) separate and distinct booms which she initially thought was thunder. The interval between the booms was short, but the sounds themselves were distinct.

Smoke continued to issue forth from the water and TORRANCE noticed a boat with flashing blue and green lights heading in the direction of the smoke.

TRUPIA was sitting on the deck of a neighbor's house on the lagoon at 16 Roneck Court. She was looking over the water and saw what looked like a match, she heard a noise and then saw an explosion.

TRUPIA stated she saw a streak rising into the sky at an angle curving a little to the west. She saw it rise for about two seconds. It made a slight arc then she lost sight for about one second, then saw an explosion. The streak was the color of a match flame. She did not see any smoke. TRUPIA stated the explosion sounded like a loud firework, almost as loud as an M-80 going off. TRUPIA heard one boom sound. The explosion was a huge ball which dropped down to the horizon slowly.

TRUPIA pointed out the Ranger house on Smith State Park, which is the direction she was looking. Just slightly to the left of the Ranger house is another house with a reddish roof, which has a cluster of trees to the left of it (this is a camp area with campers parked in the area). It was over this house which the object appeared to be when it rose into the sky. The sun was almost directly behind her at the time she was looking out over the water.

FANNING and New York State Police Investigator DE SCOON. WESTERMANN was advised of the identity of the interviewers and then supplied the following information:

WESTERMANN was with his wife LISA, and a Colly friend, KATE BORSTELMANN, on the Evening of Multily 12 10 10 king at a new house nearby his residence at approximately 840 king westermann was looking in a southerly direction while standing in an open field approximately 300 feet east of his residence. He noticed what he believed to be a parachute flare off in a southwest direction about forty degrees above the horizon. This flare was bluish/red in color and was moving at a steady speed from west to east. WESTERMANN continued to watch this flare while trying to get his wife and friend to look at it. The flare traveled in this west to east direction for what he estimated was approximately 20 seconds, at which time it started to descend in a curved descent and the same speed. WESTERMANN estimated this curved descent lasted approximately 10 seconds when the flare then opened up in a bottle or cup shape that was red in color. A second or so later, this shape expanded outward on both sides in two pieces. At this point, WESTERMANN realized these were flames. The flames dropped in a square type shape with the flames more solid on the outsides.

At the time of this incident, WESTERMANN believed the flare, and subsequent flames, were about five miles from him to the south. WESTERMANN thought at the time that when the flare initially opened up into the red bottle type shape that it was fireworks. WESTERMANN never heard any explosions.

WESTERMANN is retired, but is currently a sergeant first class in the Army National Guard assigned to the 201th Engineers, stationed in Riverhead, New York, telephone number (516) 727-1213.

MICHAEL WIRE, 308 Twining Ford Road, Richboro, Pennsylvania, 18954, telephone (215) 322-9561 was interviewed, telephonically, on July 23, 1996. WIRE provided the following information:

WIRE, who works for VISTA ENGINEERING (908) 561-4420, advised that on the night of Wednesday, July 17, 1996 he was working on the Beach Lane Bridge in Westhampton, New York. At approximately 8:45 P.M., WIRE saw what appeared to be cheap fireworks coming off the beach about 4 or 5 houses west of the bridge. WIRE described this one firework as a white spark (meteor, that went up and arched across the sky. A short time later (seconds later) WIRE observed an orange fireball in the sky to the south of the bridge. The fireball fell out of the sky. The firework that WIRE had previously observed was travelling in the direction at the fireball. Seconds after observing the fireball, WIRE heard and felt one explosion, then three other explosions for a total of four.

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Soon after the explosion, WIRE saw a National Guard Helicopter fly over the bridge.

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
